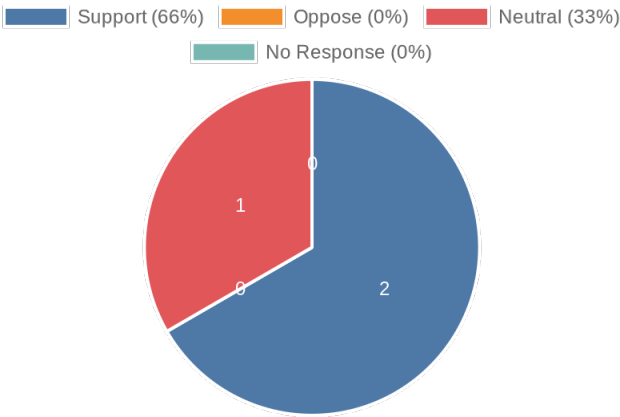

Overall Sentiment

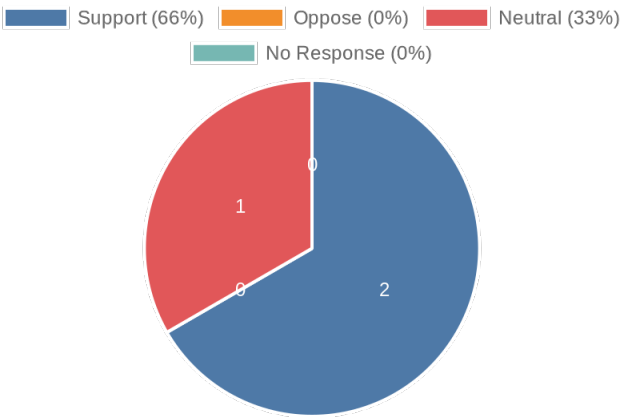

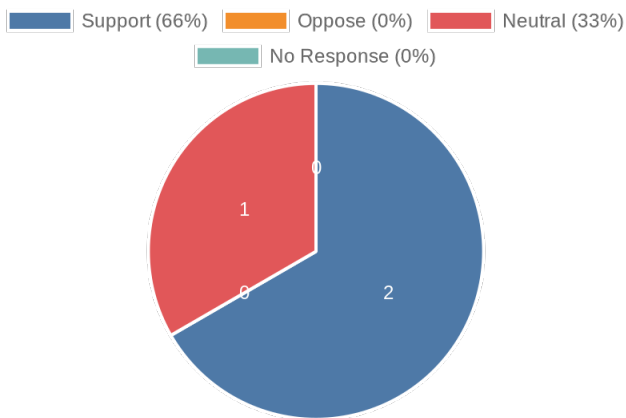
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Overall Sentiment

As a provider of Community Care Coordination services, PATH knows how effective wraparound support can stabilize lives and prevent unnecessary incarceration. Through intensive case management, housing navigation, and behavioral health linkages, we've helped individuals successfully reengage with their communities.

The one-stop Diversion, Reentry and Resource Hub will be a great resource that will centralize access for individuals who are justice impacted. We support continued investment in the Reentry Resource Hub model, especially in historically underserved communities disproportionately impacted by the legal system. To succeed, it must be rooted in partnerships with providers and communities who have long served those at the intersection of homelessness, behavioral health, and justice involvement. We urge the County to continue prioritizing upstream investments in housing, harm reduction, trauma-informed care, and reentry supports as part of a truly integrated system of care.

Hello my name is Francisco Carbajal, member of the California Restorative Justice Policy Coalition. As you may know, AB60, a bill signed into law by the California Legislature in 2023, is codified within the Welfare and Institutions Code Section 742 and Penal Code Sections 679.02 and 679.027. This new law enhances victims' rights in California by mandating that law enforcement, including city and county officials, notify victims of restorative justice options, including community-based restorative justice diversion programs. I recommend these community-based services are known to the Resources and Reentry Hubs as it will assist in the main goals of the ATI initiative to provide fair, accessible, and coordinated services that address the needs of people who are in the justice system, or who are at risk of entering it. This new victim's right will be included in the Victims' Bill of Rights, also known as Marsy's Card and Resources on June 1st, in 12 days. Thank you.

I think that a re-entry hub would be a good thing to reduce homelessness, reduce the temptation to re-engage in crime, and build stronger, more capable individuals. Also things like possibly reduce the suicide and gun violence rate so that maybe we don't need another program wasting our tax dollars.

Only two community listening sessions and a few others? Apparently about 260 individuals and 61 "groups" representing 3.2 million people. And we should be told the results.

It looks like there are a number of successful or less successful programs that are operating. The report doesn't provide specific results. It seems we have transport to housing, transport to work, job counseling, health counseling, and others in separate programs. A lot of extra busywork.

I think that many of these could be combined and integrated in the hub. We need one big plan, not a lot of little plans.
