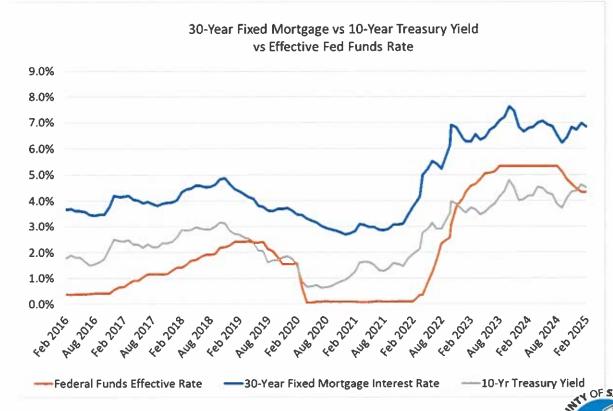






### **Inter**est Rates

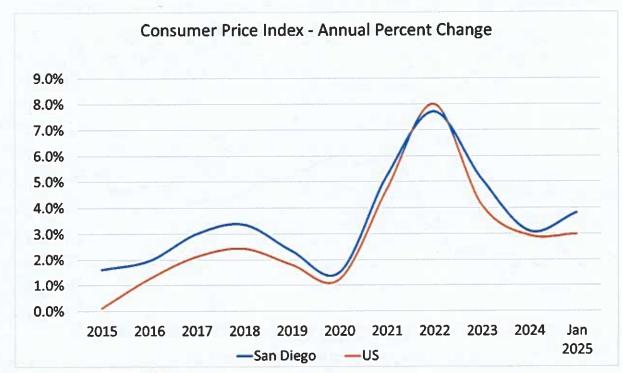
- The Federal Reserve (Fed) held the Federal Funds rate steady at 4.25% to 4.50% in January ending a threemeeting streak of rate cuts.
- Expectation that rates keep steady at the next FOMC meeting.
- The Fed is in the mode of waiting to see what policies are enacted.

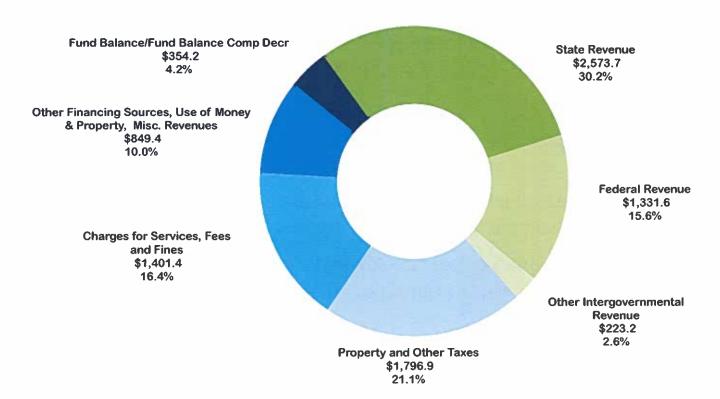




### **San Diego County Funding Sources**

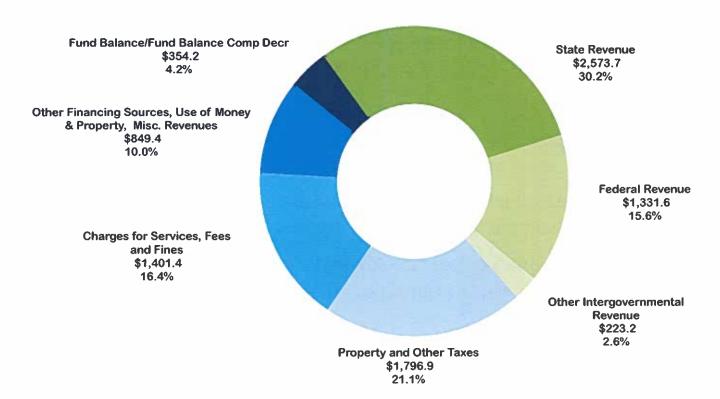

## **Potential Federal Policy Impact**



- Continue to monitor actions at the federal level to determine potential impacts to the County.
  - Many early Federal actions have been paused and are moving through judicial processes.
  - Notable activities that may impact the County are the Federal budget and reconciliation discussions.
- The County's FY 2024-25 Adopted Budget includes \$1.3 billion of federal revenue. About 10% comes directly from a federal agency.



## **State Budget Outlook**

2025-26 Governor's Budget

- The 2025-26 Governor's budget remains roughly balanced, but more clarity will come at the May Revise.
- Revenue collections have improved but spending is also anticipated to be higher.
- The State faces structural deficits of \$13 billion in 2026-27, \$19 billion in 2027-28, and \$15 billion in 2028-29.

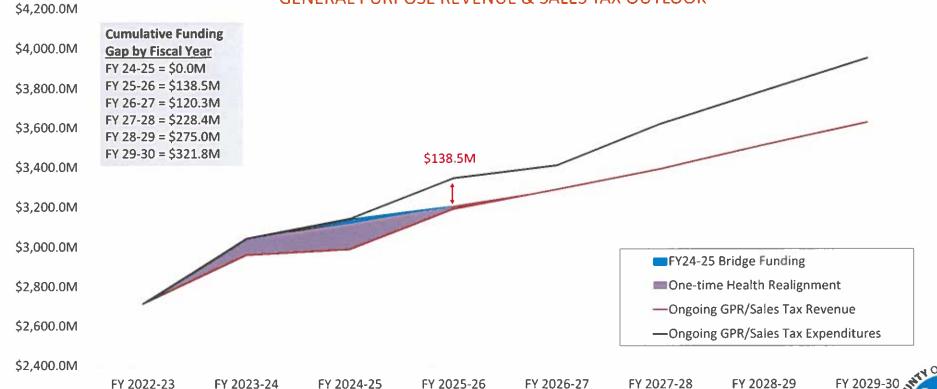

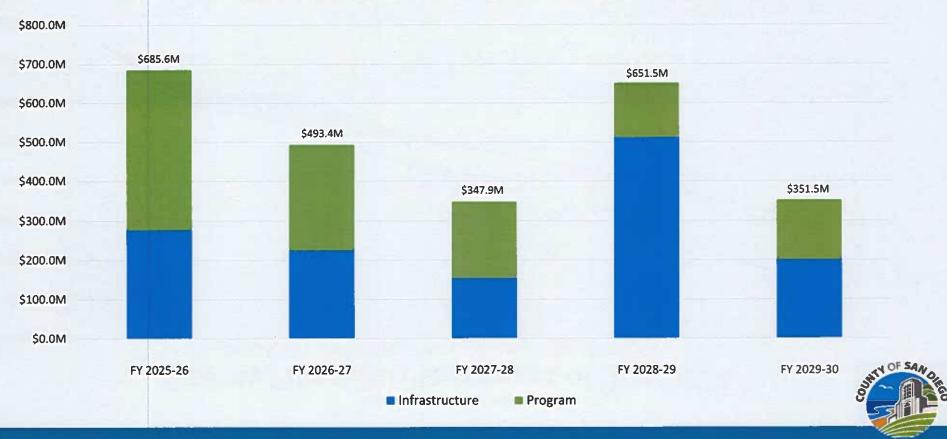
