





Good morning, Supervisors. My name is Dr. CJ Valasek, and I am a researcher and policy advocate at the Center on Policy Initiatives.

I am writing to support this item because it helps the County do something really important, which is to make sure higher labor standards and rising wages actually mean something in people’s day-to-day lives. When minimum wages go up for hospitality and event workers, that progress only matters if the money truly reaches workers’ paychecks.

From the research we have done locally, we know wage theft is still common in hospitality and event work, even when laws are strong. Many workers experience unpaid hours or minimum wage violations without realizing it, and many do not know where to turn for help. That makes enforcement and education absolutely essential.

The County’s OLSE has already been doing strong work through enforcement, outreach, and programs. This ordinance builds on that work by giving OLSE more capacity to follow through.

As I have said too many times, an ordinance, both readings, but especially the first reading, does not belong on the consent calendar. Public speakers should have the full speaking time to discuss it, not just the few seconds permitted after taking into account the entire consent calendar. As for the ordinance, I do not know why you define Higher Impact Events as temporary (sec. 21.2802(e).) It appears that this leaves out work on permanent setup, operation, or teardown of rigging, large portable power distribution systems, or both which a temp might do. This seems to negate what the ordinance is trying to do.
