





The County currently tracks carbon intensity per meal served. If reducing climate impact is a priority, reducing reliance on animal protein is one of the most effective and measurable strategies available.

Substituting beef with poultry lowers emissions modestly, but meaningful climate progress requires reducing overall animal protein per meal. Even modest shifts — such as replacing one animal-protein meal per week with a plant-based option — could significantly reduce emissions while maintaining nutritional standards and cost flexibility.

I respectfully urge the Board to commit to tracking animal protein per meal served and to adopt a measurable reduction target of at least 10% over the next five years.

This approach aligns directly with the County's sustainability framework while maintaining flexibility in procurement and menu planning.

Makes sense. We always suspected that the County does not always have a consistent, countywide process to evaluate whether existing space could meet a need before entering into new, multi-year leases because lease decisions are often driven by the needs (AKA personal needs) of individual departments.

So this would mandate that you can combine departments in one building and terminate the lease early for the separate departments if you can do it without early termination penalty.

A good aspect of this is that it would also save on maintenance, lighting, kitchens & facilities for separate offices,

and so on.

Good luck on finding a landlord who agrees to such early termination without the imposition of termination fees. Negotiation would produce better results, and the policy should mention agreement to a reduced fee.
