Hi, I am a community pediatrician at Neighborhood Health in Escondido, California. We are in the North Inland region for First 5 services. I wanted to express my unwavering support for all the benefits of this program. We serve a predominantly poor and indigent population with many barriers to health and childhood adverse experiences, almost all with Medi-Cal insurance or uninsured. I can recall numerous patients of my own who have benefitted enormously from participating in our local program's services. We regularly have babies with plagiocephaly (misshapen heads from lack of tummy time or stiff neck) and delay motor skills, and early intervention is key to preventing the need for a head-shaping molding helmet. The rate of developmental delays in children is around 20-30%, and we routinely refer for speech delay in children who are not meeting even the backstop parameters, such as at least putting 2 words together by 2 years, or 3 word phrases by 3 years, or kids who still have unintelligible speech by 4 years. These kids benefit so much from the evaluation and speech services offered – especially since the children with milder-moderate delays who are not picked up by official early intervention services (0-3, Regional Center), fall through the cracks, and have to wait until 3 years for a school district evaluation – and qualifying at the school depends so much on the resources available in that district. And for the little ones, waiting until they can be seen after age 3 is not appropriate – the early brains of kids are primed and wired to interventions precisely at this time. This applies to the kids with sensory and behavior issues, and the parenting support is invaluable in not only positive outcomes, but preventing future depression, abuse, and stress on the family as a unit due to neurodiverse kids as a population. And the case management benefits help our families who already have so many barriers such as parents who don't speak English to navigate the healthcare and school systems, and have regularly provided assistance in helping our speech delayed kids eventually qualify at the district when appropriate. The community building of relationships with other agencies generates trust and First 5 Healthy Development Services with Palomar Health is absolutely trusted by local preschools, DSEP (foster kids), and physicians alike. While there is no manual for helping to raise healthy children, First 5 is certainly a much needed tool in our area to help us raise healthy and loving families. I hope you will consider this in funding decisions and continue to direct support to First 5.

Important Facts About Lagoons:

HDS provides a protective lagoon for children and families that don't have a place in other "habitats"

In the "large bodies of water" surrounding the "lagoon", you can find higher-income families and/or families with no developmental concerns. These families have the means to access the resources available to them on the "land" or they are not in need. They are able to pay the fees associated, have position and power to advocate for themselves, and have resources readily available. In the "land" outside the "lagoon", lowincome families and/or families with moderate-to-severe developmental needs have access to services like home visiting programs, subsidized childcare, free health care, insurance, CAES, and the School District.

Families who are not in either of these situations are truly those in highest needs and need the safety of the HDS "lagoon".



HDS provides a resource to children and families who live in the "lagoon"

- Care Coordination to support families navigate the often-difficult process of getting to the "land" where higher level services reside
- Bridging support for families while they are in the process of accessing higher level services and navigating getting to the right place

Preventative education with families at HDS leads to confident and healthy caregiving, as evidenced by program outcomes which shows an increase in supportive behaviors such as spending time together, reading together, etc. We know based on evidenced-based research that children with these protective factors in place will have more protection from ACEs as they grow up.

Families who understand these protective factors based on their time with HDS may have more resources to lean on in times of need, reducing need for access to higher-level supports (social service programs, school services).

Hello, my name is Courtney Baltiyskyy. I am a mother of two young kids in Chula Vista and an advocate for children, youth, and their families. Within this commitment I work with the YMCA and help lead the Children First Collective, a group of organizations and leaders tackling the challenges of access to affordable, quality child care. One of our commitments is mental and behavior health for kids and their caregivers. First 5 plays an instrumental role in this and is now in grave jeopardy. We thank the First 5 San Diego Commission for their steadfast work to consider the budget with an equity-based approach, mitigating the risk of loosing services for those who need it the most. With a spirit of collaboration and impact evidence, San Diego has an opportunity to innovate and share the funding responsibility across new government entities, agencies, and philanthropy.

First 5 San Diego programs contribute to and absolutely enhance sustainability in the areas of child and family well-being, the environment, and the economy. I want to draw attention to the profound support offered to parents and caregivers for behavioral screenings, developmental delay screenings, and treatment for over 27,000 0-5 year olds through the Healthy Development Services program. First 5 San Diego and partners have done this important work with the resources available. Testimonials from families in First 5's reports truly showcase the transformative change experienced with this support. First 5 San Diego data is transparent and accessible. However, many families continue to experience long waiting lists, delays in assessment, and a lack of direct services. This is concerning, and the worry in lack of resources only compounds when considering the projected and significant decrease of funding from the state and local district funding. When considering mental health equity and wellbeing in San Diego, we have to choose to care for a true continuum – from young children to the adults who care for them. I ask you to do all you can to guarantee funding for HDS in your final decisions.

HDS has been the first line of referral for hundreds of physicians caring for thousands of children with mild to moderate delays. Any change (although necessary) will disrupt hard wired workflows that ensure a rapid response for children. HDS also gets referrals and supports children with more severe delays, taking the supportive role of ensuring parents are ready to act upon the referrals for intensive intervention their child needs. With the new dyadic care benefit, some of these services (such as behavior/mental health support) are fundable. However, staffing will need to change and will become more expensive. Patient access representatives are more expensive that admin's who schedule appointments and triage families without having or needing knowledge of funding streams, authorization processes and registration in the EHR. Likewise the process to bill can cost more than the FFS reimbursement by Medi-Cal. For example, a speech therapy visit may be reimbursed at 44.00/visit and it may cost 35.00 to drop the bill. The cost of that speech therapist (SLP) is about 58.00+/hr with benefits and no other overhead costs added (test protocols, scoring programs, time in report writing, etc.). Similarly, a Dyadic Behavioral Health (DBH) visit is provided by a licensed mental health therapist (or a supervised associate therapist) which costs the same or upwards from the cost of an SLP. The DBH visit reimburses at 116.00, and other services such as psychoeducational work with parent or coordination of referrals each pay a FFS rate of 20.00/15 min. These codesd are available only for Medi-Cal insured children. Other children, such as those in HMOs (e.g., Sharp Rees Stealy), most likely will not be authorized, and yet time translates to dollars spent in the effort that goes into this denial that results in no service, and no funding.

It makes sense to maximize billing and payment opportunities. Revenues are declining and something must change. However a careful fiscal analysis is needed to evaluate the shift in costs to include a different level of support, use of the EHR for registration, billing and reporting, and to accomodate licensed and licensable, billable staff with appropriate supervision. Many bilingual, bicultural child development specialists need to be laid off, while bilingual, bicultural licensed staff are difficult to find and recruit. Thee risk is that the funding cuts will result in losing a team's diversity, and will increase costs, although certainly, with regard to behavior services, this change must be explored to take advantage of dyadic care services now being reimbursed by the State. Might you consider starting with Behavior Services. Based upon experience with HealthySteps, I would expect this transition to billable services will take a year as programs transition to systems and a workforce that fits the new model. Is there the possibility of a funding commitment, with a hard timeline, to bridge the gap while the more sustainable funding streams are addressed?

As an aside, how do we ensure the child development specialists we lose transition to roles that increase child care slots (and will compensation be comparable?), so that we don't lose this talent?

This comment is in regards to the funding cuts to the Healthy Development Services program.

I am writing to you both as a concerned early childhood educator and a concerned parent. I am a director of a preschool in Carlsbad and I hold a MA degree in early childhood education. I am also a mom of four children under age five, one of which has personally benefited from this program.

At our preschool, we have had the pleasure of hosting parenting classes at our site thanks to this program. When we have a child who is struggling, this program is our first line for offering support and education for the families we serve. This program is unique in that it really is a full family support program, not just services for the child. So many families have concerns about behavior, routine, discipline, and other parenting challenges but don't have a lot of places to turn for answers. Pediatrician appointments are quick and rarely go into detail about these concerns. Finding answers online is a nightmare - everybody has 10 different answers to every problem and it is very difficult to parse out what is evidence based and how to implement solutions for their unique family. The nature of this program has also been beneficial because parents who are resistant to acknowledging that their child needs support have been more receptive to this type of program as opposed to a higher level such as the school district.

As someone who has been in the education field for over ten years, I can honestly say we need programs like this more than ever before. Since the covid-19 pandemic we have seen an increase in challenging behaviors and emotional regulation difficulties, delays in development, toilet training challenges, and parental stress. What we have not seen is an increase in IFSP/IEPs, which shows that while the challenges parents are facing are mounting, the support for these families has not followed the same trend. This is one of the few programs that meets this need and I worry about how this will affect us personally and as a society.

My own son is one of the many children benefiting from this program. My child struggles with emotional regulation and sensory processing, but he does not have a diagnosis that would warrant an IEP. After going through the support courses offered by HDS, we were referring to play therapy right after my son turned 3. I was so excited that my son would be able to receive this support because there isn't a whole lot out there for the kids who need some extra support but don't need enough to warrant district services. So often parents will try to get their children support through the school district but they don't qualify immediately and that critical window of the first five years closes before they are even able to secure a diagnosis. You can imagine my frustration and heartbreak when we found out, after only three sessions, that funding was being cut and we wouldn't be receiving the full 26 sessions. There is a clear and powerful message in this decision: kids like my son, the ones not "bad off" enough for IEPS, don't

matter. We are supposed to stand by, watch our children struggle, and wait until they are finally behind enough to warrant higher levels of intervention as opposed to giving them much needed support to possibly prevent reaching that level. By the time they reach this level they are behind academically and emotionally and often carry the stigma that comes with being the more challenging child. This decision goes against the plethora of research that supports the first five years being the best time to offer support to children and puts children in a position to be constantly playing catch up.

This decision will cause the achievement gap between socioeconomic groups to widen. Like many families, we are not in a position to pay for private services. More often than not, insurance requires a diagnosis to cover any services and still fights tooth and nail to provide as little support as they can get away with. With economic pressures increasing and no sign of relief coming anytime soon, now is not the time to turn our backs on these families.

I strongly urge you to consider the long-term consequences of children and families losing access to this support. As a society, we all suffer when individuals do not learn healthy emotional regulation or have the support they need to be secure, productive members of society.

I appreciate your time and consideration regarding this matter.


I am also a preschool director with 40 years of experience in early education. I work at a local nonprofit school and am actively involved in serving and connecting with our community every day. Through my work, I witness firsthand the positive impact of services like those offered by Healthy Development. For example, First 5 has come to our school to conduct hearing and vision screenings. Over the years, I have referred countless parents to First 5 for support and resources. And to be very honest with you I have a family in that I'm going to refer to First 5 next week when they are home from vacation. The 2-year-old boy has a very limited vocabulary (about 10 words such as mama) and frequently gets upset when his classmates don't understand him. This is so hard to watch because he wants to communicate with his friends but is unable to right now. The best part about this situation is once this child receives speech therapy his life will become easier and it's a matter of a couple of years when we see him talking and effectively communicating with those around him, so he too can live a relatively typical life.

The resources provided by Healthy Development Services are vital to the well-being of our community. Cutting them would be a great loss to the children and families who depend on these programs to thrive. I am asking you to please reconsider making cuts to his program.

As a Speech Language Pathologist currently working at HDS, I believe it's crucial to share my experiences across various settings and highlight the importance of the Healthy Development Services (HDS) program. One of the most frustrating aspects of my career has been seeing children who are in desperate need of speech and language support, yet are unable to access care for various reasons. These barriers may include lack of insurance, insurance denial for evaluation or treatment, prohibitively high co-pays, or the child's delays not being significant enough to qualify through their school district, among others. HDS steps in to support these children and families, ensuring they receive the services they need when they otherwise would not receive them. Early intervention is vital for a child's success, not only in the short term but for their lifelong development.

I began my journey at HDS during grad school and spent the next six years working in private practice, always with the goal of returning to HDS. Why? Because I realized then, and continue to see now, how unique and important this program is, offering services to families at no-cost.

Given the critical role HDS plays in supporting children and families who would otherwise go without necessary care, I urge decision-makers to consider the significant impact of this program when making funding decisions. Investing in early intervention through HDS is an investment in the long-term success and well-being of these children and, ultimately, our community

First 5 San Diego Commission Public Comment in Support of HDS

I am grateful for the opportunity to bring to your attention one of the ways a reduction in funding to Healthy Development Services (HDS) will have a substantial impact on our communities, particularly in the North Inland region.

The importance of having developmental services such as speech, occupational and physical therapy offered through HDS is critical given the considerable barriers families in our communities face. Children who have Medi-Cal coverage, which is approximately 83% in the North Inland region, are largely authorized to Rady Children's in San Diego. Obstacles such as high gas costs and distances families must travel to access those services contribute to the existing challenge of asking for time off work. Additionally, wait lists for those insurance funded services will inevitably grow due to the decrease of available developmental therapies in HDS as a result of a decrease in funding. Our rural communities of Fallbrook, Ramona, Julian, Borrego, Valley Center/Pauma Valley, and Santa Isabel already experience hardship in accessing essential services, necessitating trips to Escondido. Traveling to San Diego and even Oceanside adds further strain on these families, particularly for working parents and caregivers with less flexibility. Many of our immigrant families are already experiencing fear in even traveling outside their own neighborhoods.

We value the relationships we have established with our external early intervention partners through our regional school districts and the San Diego Regional Center. Together, our efforts in supporting families by either providing services or linking eligible children beyond HDS, ensures that no child falls through the cracks.

Thank you for allowing me to share this information and for your commitment to the health and development of young children. Your consideration of these concerns as you make decisions regarding funding is profoundly appreciated.



I recently moved to San Diego from Boston, Massachusetts, and have noticed the differences in the quality of early intervention services almost immediately. The early intervention and parent training provided by First 5 is a gold standard of care which I had only ever read about in textbooks and scientific articles before becoming a resident of San Diego. These services are an essential public health effort to support the long-term success of at-risk and disabled youth across their lifespan. For example, I will be discharging a 2 year old from individual speech/language treatment at the end of this month who received services through First 5 and would not have been ready for discharge without it. There is a clear and strong research basis for these interventions and their continued implementation is vital to the continued success of child and disability services throughout all of San Diego. When I am able to successfully discharge a child from therapy at two years old, I am then able to see even more children under 3 who are in need of evidence based early invention treatment. This reduces the caseload in early intervention services as well as properly streamlining transition to schoolbased services to prevent undue burden on the public school system. Hi, I am a community pediatrician at Neighborhood Health in Escondido, California. We are in the North Inland region for First 5 services. I wanted to express my unwavering support for all the benefits of this program. We serve a predominantly poor and indigent population with many barriers to health and childhood adverse experiences, almost all with Medi-Cal insurance or uninsured. I can recall numerous patients of my own who have benefitted enormously from participating in our local program's services. We regularly have babies with plagiocephaly (misshapen heads from lack of tummy time or stiff neck) and delay motor skills, and early intervention is key to preventing the need for a head-shaping molding helmet. The rate of developmental delays in children is around 20-30%, and we routinely refer for speech delay in children who are not meeting even the backstop parameters, such as at least putting 2 words together by 2 years, or 3 word phrases by 3 years, or kids who still have unintelligible speech by 4 years. These kids benefit so much from the evaluation and speech services offered – especially since the children with milder-moderate delays who are not picked up by official early intervention services (0-3, Regional Center), fall through the cracks, and have to wait until 3 years for a school district evaluation – and qualifying at the school depends so much on the resources available in that district. And for the little ones, waiting until they can be seen after age 3 is not appropriate – the early brains of kids are primed and wired to interventions precisely at this time. This applies to the kids with sensory and behavior issues, and the parenting support is invaluable in not only positive outcomes, but preventing future depression, abuse, and stress on the family as a unit due to neurodiverse kids as a population. And the case management benefits help our families who already have so many barriers such as parents who don't speak English to navigate the healthcare and school systems, and have regularly provided assistance in helping our speech delayed kids eventually qualify at the district when appropriate. The community building of relationships with other agencies generates trust and First 5 Healthy Development Services with Palomar Health is absolutely trusted by local preschools, DSEP (foster kids), and physicians alike. While there is no manual for helping to raise healthy children, First 5 is certainly a much needed tool in our area to help us raise healthy and loving families. I hope you will consider this in funding decisions and continue to direct support to First 5.

Important Facts About Lagoons:

HDS provides a protective lagoon for children and families that don't have a place in other "habitats"

In the "large bodies of water" surrounding the "lagoon", you can find higher-income families and/or families with no developmental concerns. These families have the means to access the resources available to them on the "land" or they are not in need. They are able to pay the fees associated, have position and power to advocate for themselves, and have resources readily available. In the "land" outside the "lagoon", lowincome families and/or families with moderate-to-severe developmental needs have access to services like home visiting programs, subsidized childcare, free health care, insurance, CAES, and the School District.

Families who are not in either of these situations are truly those in highest needs and need the safety of the HDS "lagoon".



HDS provides a resource to children and families who live in the "lagoon"

- Care Coordination to support families navigate the often-difficult process of getting to the "land" where higher level services reside
- Bridging support for families while they are in the process of accessing higher level services and navigating getting to the right place
- Resource for community programs, schools, and healthcare providers to supplement the support they provide to their families and act as a partner

Hello, my name is Courtney Baltiyskyy. I am a mother of two young kids in Chula Vista and an advocate for children, youth, and their families. Within this commitment I work with the YMCA and help lead the Children First Collective, a group of organizations and leaders tackling the challenges of access to affordable, quality child care. One of our commitments is mental and behavior health for kids and their caregivers. First 5 plays an instrumental role in this and is now in grave jeopardy. We thank the First 5 San Diego Commission for their steadfast work to consider the budget with an equity-based approach, mitigating the risk of loosing services for those who need it the most. With a spirit of collaboration and impact evidence, San Diego has an opportunity to innovate and share the funding responsibility across new government entities, agencies, and philanthropy.

First 5 San Diego programs contribute to and absolutely enhance sustainability in the areas of child and family well-being, the environment, and the economy. I want to draw attention to the profound support offered to parents and caregivers for behavioral screenings, developmental delay screenings, and treatment for over 27,000 0-5 year olds through the Healthy Development Services program. First 5 San Diego and partners have done this important work with the resources available. Testimonials from families in First 5's reports truly showcase the transformative change experienced with this support. First 5 San Diego data is transparent and accessible. However, many families continue to experience long waiting lists, delays in assessment, and a lack of direct services. This is concerning, and the worry in lack of resources only compounds when considering the projected and significant decrease of funding from the state and local district funding. When considering mental health equity and wellbeing in San Diego, we have to choose to care for a true continuum – from young children to the adults who care for them. I ask you to do all you can to guarantee funding for HDS in your final decisions.

HDS has been the first line of referral for hundreds of physicians caring for thousands of children with mild to moderate delays. Any change (although necessary) will disrupt hard wired workflows that ensure a rapid response for children. HDS also gets referrals and supports children with more severe delays, taking the supportive role of ensuring parents are ready to act upon the referrals for intensive intervention their child needs. With the new dyadic care benefit, some of these services (such as behavior/mental health support) are fundable. However, staffing will need to change and will become more expensive. Patient access representatives are more expensive that admin's who schedule appointments and triage families without having or needing knowledge of funding streams, authorization processes and registration in the EHR. Likewise the process to bill can cost more than the FFS reimbursement by Medi-Cal. For example, a speech therapy visit may be reimbursed at 44.00/visit and it may cost 35.00 to drop the bill. The cost of that speech therapist (SLP) is about 58.00+/hr with benefits and no other overhead costs added (test protocols, scoring programs, time in report writing, etc.). Similarly, a Dyadic Behavioral Health (DBH) visit is provided by a licensed mental health therapist (or a supervised associate therapist) which costs the same or upwards from the cost of an SLP. The DBH visit reimburses at 116.00, and other services such as psychoeducational work with parent or coordination of referrals each pay a FFS rate of 20.00/15 min. These codesd are available only for Medi-Cal insured children. Other children, such as those in HMOs (e.g., Sharp Rees Stealy), most likely will not be authorized, and yet time translates to dollars spent in the effort that goes into this denial that results in no service, and no funding.

It makes sense to maximize billing and payment opportunities. Revenues are declining and something must change. However a careful fiscal analysis is needed to evaluate the shift in costs to include a different level of support, use of the EHR for registration, billing and reporting, and to accomodate licensed and licensable, billable staff with appropriate supervision. Many bilingual, bicultural child development specialists need to be laid off, while bilingual, bicultural licensed staff are difficult to find and recruit. Thee risk is that the funding cuts will result in losing a team's diversity, and will increase costs, although certainly, with regard to behavior services, this change must be explored to take advantage of dyadic care services now being reimbursed by the State. Might you consider starting with Behavior Services. Based upon experience with HealthySteps, I would expect this transition to billable services will take a year as programs transition to systems and a workforce that fits the new model. This comment is in regards to the funding cuts to the Healthy Development Services program.

I am writing to you both as a concerned early childhood educator and a concerned parent. I am a director of a preschool in Carlsbad and I hold a MA degree in early childhood education. I am also a mom of four children under age five, one of which has personally benefited from this program.

At our preschool, we have had the pleasure of hosting parenting classes at our site thanks to this program. When we have a child who is struggling, this program is our first line for offering support and education for the families we serve. This program is unique in that it really is a full family support program, not just services for the child. So many families have concerns about behavior, routine, discipline, and other parenting challenges but don't have a lot of places to turn for answers. Pediatrician appointments are quick and rarely go into detail about these concerns. Finding answers online is a nightmare - everybody has 10 different answers to every problem and it is very difficult to parse out what is evidence based and how to implement solutions for their unique family. The nature of this program has also been beneficial because parents who are resistant to acknowledging that their child needs support have been more receptive to this type of program as opposed to a higher level such as the school district.

As someone who has been in the education field for over ten years, I can honestly say we need programs like this more than ever before. Since the covid-19 pandemic we have seen an increase in challenging behaviors and emotional regulation difficulties, delays in development, toilet training challenges, and parental stress. What we have not seen is an increase in IFSP/IEPs, which shows that while the challenges parents are facing are mounting, the support for these families has not followed the same trend. This is one of the few programs that meets this need and I worry about how this will affect us personally and as a society.

My own son is one of the many children benefiting from this program. My child struggles with emotional regulation and sensory processing, but he does not have a diagnosis that would warrant an IEP. After going through the support courses offered by HDS, we were referring to play therapy right after my son turned 3. I was so excited that my son would be able to receive this support because there isn't a whole lot out there for the kids who need some extra support but don't need enough to warrant district services. So often parents will try to get their children support through the school district but they don't qualify immediately and that critical window of the first five years closes before they are even able to secure a diagnosis. You can imagine my frustration and heartbreak when we found out, after only three sessions, that funding was being cut and we wouldn't be receiving the full 26 sessions. There is a clear and powerful message in this decision: kids like my son, the ones not "bad off" enough for IEPS, don't

matter. We are supposed to stand by, watch our children struggle, and wait until they are finally behind enough to warrant higher levels of intervention as opposed to giving them much needed support to possibly prevent reaching that level. By the time they reach this level they are behind academically and emotionally and often carry the stigma that comes with being the more challenging child. This decision goes against the plethora of research that supports the first five years being the best time to offer support to children and puts children in a position to be constantly playing catch up.

This decision will cause the achievement gap between socioeconomic groups to widen. Like many families, we are not in a position to pay for private services. More often than not, insurance requires a diagnosis to cover any services and still fights tooth and nail to provide as little support as they can get away with. With economic pressures increasing and no sign of relief coming anytime soon, now is not the time to turn our backs on these families.

I strongly urge you to consider the long-term consequences of children and families losing access to this support. As a society, we all suffer when individuals do not learn healthy emotional regulation or have the support they need to be secure, productive members of society.

I appreciate your time and consideration regarding this matter.



Through my work, I witness firsthand the positive impact of services like those offered by Healthy Development. For example, First 5 has come to our school to conduct hearing and vision screenings. Over the years, I have referred countless parents to First 5 for support and resources. And to be very honest with you I have a family in that I'm going to refer to First 5 next week when they are home from vacation. The 2-year-old boy has a very limited vocabulary (about 10 words such as mama) and frequently gets upset when his classmates don't understand him. This is so hard to watch because he wants to communicate with his friends but is unable to right now. The best part about this situation is once this child receives speech therapy his life will become easier and it's a matter of a couple of years when we see him talking and effectively communicating with those around him, so he too can live a relatively typical life.

The resources provided by Healthy Development Services are vital to the well-being of our community. Cutting them would be a great loss to the children and families who depend on these programs to thrive. I am asking you to please reconsider making cuts to his program.

I am grateful for the opportunity to bring to your attention one of the ways a reduction in funding to Healthy Development Services (HDS) will have a substantial impact on our communities, particularly in the North Inland region.

The importance of having developmental services such as speech, occupational and physical therapy offered through HDS is critical given the considerable barriers families in our communities face. Children who have Medi-Cal coverage, which is approximately 83% in the North Inland region, are largely authorized to Rady Children's in San Diego. Obstacles such as high gas costs and distances families must travel to access those services contribute to the existing challenge of asking for time off work. Additionally, wait lists for those insurance funded services will inevitably grow due to the decrease of available developmental therapies in HDS as a result of a decrease in funding. Our rural communities of Fallbrook, Ramona, Julian, Borrego, Valley Center/Pauma Valley, and Santa Isabel already experience hardship in accessing essential services, necessitating trips to Escondido. Traveling to San Diego and even Oceanside adds further strain on these families, particularly for working parents and caregivers with less flexibility. Many of our immigrant families are already experiencing fear in even traveling outside their own neighborhoods.

We value the relationships we have established with our external early intervention partners through our regional school districts and the San Diego Regional Center. Together, our efforts in supporting families by either providing services or linking eligible children beyond HDS, ensures that no child falls through the cracks.

Thank you for allowing me to share this information and for your commitment to the health and development of young children. Your consideration of these concerns as you make decisions regarding funding is profoundly appreciated.


