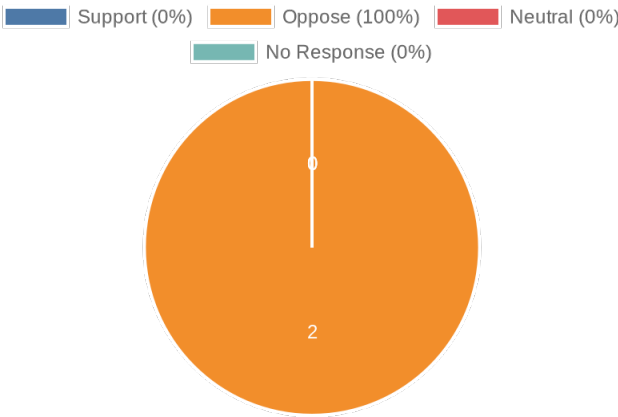

Overall Sentiment



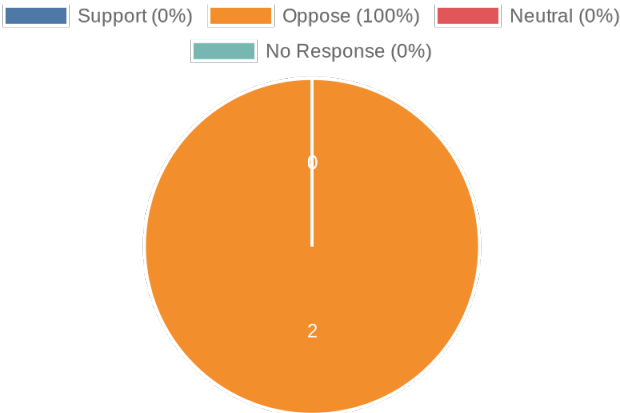

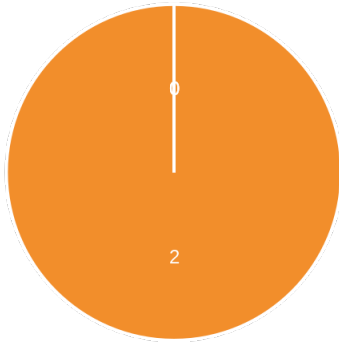
Overall Sentiment

We strongly support event safety and believe every worker deserves a protected, professional environment. However, the County's proposal to "Improve Safety and Labor Standards in County Parks" goes beyond the scope of California Assembly Bill 1775 (AB 1775). AB 1775 is a state safety and training law, not a wage or labor statute. It requires all stage employees to complete OSHA-10 training, and only supervisors or department heads to hold OSHA-30 and ETCP certification. By adding wage, benefit, and local-hire mandates, the County's plan converts a safety law into a labor ordinance, creating legal conflict and administrative burden. True alignment with AB 1775 means focusing on training, certification, and Cal/OSHA enforcement—not new economic or hiring rules that risk discouraging qualified, safety-driven professionals from County events.

Recommendation 1 is OK.

Recommendation 2a—there is no data presented supporting a \$25/hour minimum wage. No attachments. #2b—you say Event producers are permitted to hold roughly twelve such events—known as "higher impact" events—in County parks each year. ' Requiring them to set up ERISA or health benefits for just 1 or 2 events is ridiculous, unless it is just during the event, preparation, and takedown, Sounds like a good way to keep such events off of County land. As to recommendation 2c, what if a traveling entertainment company travels with its own crew. Finding San Diego County stagehands might be impossible for an out-of-town company on fairly short notice.
