Environmental Review Update Checklist Form For Projects with Previously Approved Environmental Documents

FOR PURPOSES OF CONSIDERATION OF Tijuana River Valley Regional Park Habitat Restoration Plan Project

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines Sections 15162 through 15164 set forth the criteria for determining the appropriate additional environmental documentation, if any, to be completed when there is a previously adopted Negative Declaration (ND), Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND), or a previously certified Environmental Impact Report (EIR) covering the project for which a subsequent discretionary action is required. This Environmental Review Update Checklist Form has been prepared in accordance with CEQA Guidelines, Section 15164(e), to explain the rationale for determining whether any additional environmental documentation is needed for the subject discretionary action.

1) Background on the previously certified MND:

A MND for the Tijuana River Valley Regional Park Habitat Restoration Plan (Project) (SCH #2023110494) was adopted by the County of San Diego (County) Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) on March 1, 2024. The MND analyzed a Habitat Restoration Plan that detailed restoration activities including implementation, maintenance, and monitoring of approximately 1,740 acres of County-owned or managed parcels located within the Tijuana River Valley Regional Park (TRVRP). On the basis of the MND, it was determined that although the Project could have a significant effect on the environment, there will not be a significant effect in this case with the incorporation of mitigation measures as part of the Project. The following issue areas were determined to have a less than significant effect on the environment with mitigation incorporated: Biological Resources; Cultural Resources; Geology & Soils; Land Use & Planning; Noise; Tribal Cultural Resources; and Mandatory Findings of Significance.

4) Summary of the activities previously authorized:

County DPR received funding from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) Prop 1 Watershed Restoration Grant Program to complete a Habitat Restoration Plan (HRP) for restoration activities on primarily County-owned or managed parcels located within the TRVRP. The activities detailed in the HRP, or approved Project, include implementation, maintenance, and monitoring addressing the restoration of approximately 1,740 acres of mixed wetland, riparian, and upland habitats. Specifically, the step-by-step process for phased implementation of the HRP would include (1) Project identification/phasing; (2) Execution Plan development; (3) pre-restoration implementation activities; (4) restoration implementation activities; and (5) post-implementation maintenance activities. The goals of the HRP were to identify, prioritize, and implement phased large-scale restoration throughout County-owned and managed property within the TRVRP. On March 1, 2024, the Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation approved the Project and adopted the associated Mitigated

Negative

Declaration.

Since adoption of the MND in 2024, the County DPR received funding through the United States Navy, Naval Base Coronado's Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration (REPI) Program for implementation of approximately 20 acres of restoration work across three properties associated with the approved Project. Habitat restoration activities throughout TRVRP were covered in the approved Project. The specific properties for restoration through this grant funding include the TRVRP Campground, Disney Property, and Skibbies Property. This funding will allow DPR to demolish dilapidated structures, remove non-native or invasive habitat, and restore the areas with native habitat at the Disney Property (approximately 2.44 acres) and the Skibbies Property (approximately 10 acres), both included within the approved Project. The TRVRP Campground location was not included in the approved Project because the approved Project focused on large-scale restoration of full parcels and the TRVRP Campground site is a developed park with yurts, tent camping, trails, and other amenities for public use. Activities at the TRVRP Camparound (approximately 5 acres) include removal of non-native or invasive plants and supplemental planting of the site with plant species already located on the site. These activities were covered in the approved Project. These activities would be different than those proposed at the first two properties because the first two properties involve full-scale restoration of the entire parcels whereas activities at the TRVRP Campground involve supplemental plantings of existing areas. The activities proposed at the TRVRP Campground site are covered under the approved Project and are typical of maintenance and monitoring activities conducted by DPR across all DPR properties which, if not included here, would otherwise be exempt from CEQA as they are not a change in existing conditions or existing maintenance typically performed at the site.

There no substantial changes are proposed in the Project. There are also no substantial changes in the circumstances under which the Project will be undertaken that will require major revisions to the previous MND due to the involvement of significant effects or a

substantial increase in the severity of previously identified effects. Therefore, the previously adopted MND is adequate without modification and no additional environmental documentation is needed.

The Project is generally consistent with the approved Project but expands the non-native plant species removal and restoration slightly to capture the TRVRP Campground site. Activities proposed at the TRVRP Campground site would consist of removal of non-native and/or invasive plant species and replating with native plants. These activities are analyzed in the approved Project and are also consistent with typical maintenance and monitoring of DPR properties to ensure native habitats are thriving. All other activities for which a subsequent discretionary action is required are similarly consistent with the approved Project.

INTRODUCTION

CEQA Guidelines Sections 15162 through 15164 set forth the criteria for determining the appropriate additional environmental documentation, if any, to be prepared when there is a previously adopted ND or a previously certified EIR for a Project.

CEQA Guidelines Section 15162(a) and 15163 state that when an ND has been adopted or an EIR certified for a project, no Subsequent or Supplemental EIR or Subsequent Negative Declaration shall be prepared for that project unless the lead agency determines, on the basis of substantial evidence in light of the whole public record, one or more of the following:

- Substantial changes are proposed in the Project which will require major revisions
 of the previous EIR or ND due to the involvement of new significant environmental
 effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant
 effects.
- 2. Substantial changes occur with respect to the circumstances under which the Project is undertaken which will require major revisions of the previous EIR or ND due to the involvement of new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of previously identified significant effects.

CEQA Guidelines, Section 15164(b), states that an Addendum to a previously adopted ND may be prepared if only minor technical changes or additions are necessary or none

of the conditions described in Section 15162 calling for the preparation of a subsequent EIR or negative declaration have occurred.

If the factors listed in CEQA Guidelines, Sections 15162, 15163, or 15164, have not occurred or are not met, no changes to the previously certified EIR or previously adopted ND are necessary.
