#### Hi Supervisors,

There are some good - very good, and long overdue - recommendations in here. But the equity stuff is divisive and old and more and more people are being turned off and not buying it.

Equity means fairness. You won't get equity by focussing on certain groups or zip codes. If you want to be truly equitable and fair, you need to focus on the individual.

The original 4/5 equity statement said (before the actual data analysis) "that countywide data shows that Black/African American and Hispanic/Latino victims of homicide are more likely to be killed by a firearm than another weapon type." A death is a death, and any death is a tragedy and the item at issue here, is death by guns in any number, whether Black, Latino, Asian, or Caucasian. So I hope we're over this nonsense thinking. Comments on the Recommendations (attached):

- 1 & 2: I think that it's a disservice to focus educational content on high-risk populations, particularly since it contains general items such as mental health, domestic violence, and suicide prevention which can happen anywhere even if gun and other violence is mostly in certain areas. Moreover, attendance at such events is often based on family or work considerations, so the exact location of these events usually does not really matter.
- 3 & 11: I think that the County should identify organizations that operate violence intervention programs, including street outreach and violence interruption all over the County, not just in the upper and lower corners.

Moreover, people in East County would have a hard time getting service, so this is discriminatory. And I don't know why HHSA should be involved - extra \$ for it?

4: Gun Lock distribution is great.

5: Not sure why County Employees need special training other than what is taught in the other seminars. Why not cancel this special training and save a buck (or \$150 thou.)?

7: BHS should already be aware of suicide risk and screening patients for this in the normal course of business. More extra \$?

8-10: Good. Communication is probably your best bet to mitigate this problem.

- 12. The Hospital is for patients recovering from their injuries. It is far more practical to locate such post-injury support services in the community (maybe pair them up with pre-injury support.) So save a buck (or \$100 thou.)
- 14. Equity stuff is OK after trying out a good comprehensive plan and not prejudging the situation based on equity (which BTW really isn't since equity really means fairness.)

And finally, I hope that the Community forums were free and open discussions not restricted to a few choices, and not just to assess the community's 'temperament' (as my wife described one such forum.)

## Gun Violence Community Needs Assessment Recommendations Work Plan

#### **Guiding Principles:**

- **Community-Led:** Those who are frequently and directly exposed to gun violence must be involved, and collaborative action is needed from representatives from diverse sectors.
- Solution-Focused: Actions should result in concrete assistance to those working on these issues and affected by gun violence.
- **Evidence-Informed:** Using reliable data and research is critical to understanding who is most affected by gun violence and what factors and circumstances are contributing to violence or helping to create safety. Combine research, context, and experience to inform this understanding.
- **Person-Centered:** Understand that racial injustice has created neighborhoods of concentrated disadvantage, perpetuated poverty, and caused multigenerational harm. Actions must promote healing and minimize harm.
- **Equity-Oriented:** Adequate resources, including tailored interventions, should be directed to people who are experiencing health and social inequities, so they have the opportunity to attain their full potential.

#### Time frame estimates for completion of proposed actions:

**Short-term** indicates actions are completed by the end of Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-24. **Mid-term** indicates collaborative planning or actions precede an implementation anticipated by the end of FY 2024-25. **Long-term** indicates that infrastructure, funding, or significant collaboration or policy change may be needed to complete actions.

Work Plan actions include opportunities to enhance or expand upon existing efforts and explore new areas of focus or investment.
