Now if only we had hand held or automobile-attached pollution monitors to zero in on the pollution, as I suggested, it would be greatly reduced by now. Accurate data at monitoring agencies would also help.

It would look ugly, but instead of restricting the TJ River in a sewage emergency, consider putting a plastic or concrete lining on the riverbanks to speed up the flow out to sea.
