




disrupted childcare arrangements Households with




Nearly all parents agreed that having safe, reliable childcare is crucial for parents to be able to work.'








Percent of children 0-23 who have an available months with working parents








Employer Perspective: Keeping the Employee

- Employers vs. San Diego cost of living
- Basic math: rent + food + insurance + childcare + commute = is it worth it?
- Housing debates and childcare debates similar themes: supply vs demand
- Not just limited to 0-3 years ongoing challenge
- Gaps in traditional social nets
- August 2022 men regained all jobs lost in COVID. Women still 110k +
- Employers want to be a partner in solutions
- We know about some that work!







Case Study:

Daycare cost for this kid, not potty trained: \$14,300

7:30am- 5:30pm



Solutions & Employer Opportunity



- Childcare struggles start during pregnancy
- Wait lists/fees/search = time & resources
- Importance of networks
- Flexible work hours & remote work (but be careful here!)
- Paid leave
- Referral supports & subsidies

High barrier

- Emergency care & back up care
- On site or co-located care

- Space



Chicano Federation Child Development Programs

The Chicano Federation's mission is to invest in communities through programs that build resiliency and promote self-sufficiency. We serve over 25,000 families through our child-centered services.

Child Nutrition Program- Provides healthy food and nutrition and educational support to providers in San Diego, Orange, Riverside and Imperial Counties. Serves 850 providers.

Barrio Logan Child Development Center- Full-day age and developmentally appropriate preschool program for three-and four-year-old children. Serves 72 children and their families.

Infant Toddler Program- An Early Childhood program that provides subsidized care to children ages 0-3 through state-licensed Family Child Care Homes in a provider education network. Serves 73 providers and 300 families.

Home Based Early Head Start & Head Start Program- Designed to empower the parents of children 0 months to 5 years old and educate them on their child's learning and development. Home visitors provide weekly in-home parenting and child development education. Serves 84 Families.

Comienza tu Guarderia/ Women's Small Business Development-This program provides support to Spanish-Speaking women to start their own family childcare business through outreach, trainings and one on one support. Supported 25 providers in obtaining their license.

STEPS- This program implements a comprehensive effort to improve the economic self-sufficiency and strengthen the quality of care being provided by family childcare providers in the City Heights, Barrio Logan, and Chula Vista areas with the overall goal of ensuring children in those areas are supported to reach their fullest potential. Serves 45 providers.
