ESTIMATED COST, STAFFING, AND CONTRACT NEEDS FOR ENFORCEMENT OF THE RENTAL PRICE GOUGING AND FEE EXPLOITATION ORDINANCE

OVERVIEW

On November 4, 2025 (15), the San Diego County Board of Supervisors (Board) took action to address the housing crisis impacting residents across San Diego County. As part of this action, the Board directed County Counsel to draft an ordinance 1) prohibiting the charge of fees in addition to rent that is in excess of a percentage of the cost of monthly rent and 2) requiring landlords to disclose the total cost of their residential rental units. Additionally, the Board directed the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to report back within 120 days to estimate the cost, staffing, and contract needs to enforce violations of the proposed ordinance. Today's memorandum provides an update on the draft ordinance, and includes the cost, staffing, and contract needs to enforce violations.

Currently, the County of San Diego (County) provides outreach, education, and legal assistance for renters through contracts administered by County Health and Human Services Agency, Housing and Community Development Services (HCDS). On July 13, 2021 (7), the Board authorized the procurement for a contract to provide tenant legal services to San Diego County residents. This program supports vulnerable populations with legal services, housing counseling, and eviction prevention for low-income households throughout San Diego County. Since 2023, the program has supported over 21,000 households. In 2025, the program delivered tenant focused essential resources and services to 6,400 households, including housing counseling and educational outreach, with more than 2,300 of these households requiring direct legal assistance.

Beyond direct legal intervention, HCDS offers the Fair Housing Program to residents. This program serves as a proactive regulatory resource by distributing comprehensive outreach and educational materials via public seminars, news articles, and focused training. These efforts are specifically designed to assist residents with any barriers by addressing Fair Housing impediments and ensuring rigorous compliance with laws governing reasonable accommodations and equitable access. Since 2023, the program has delivered a total of 27 public seminars, published 29 news articles, provided over 30 hours of training, assisted more

than 186 individuals and families through referrals, and conducted 100 fair housing tests with an annual budget of approximately \$100,000. By providing a clear framework for both housing providers and tenants to navigate complex resources and emerging legislative events, the program mitigates potential conflicts before they escalate to the point of displacement.

Draft Ordinance

In response to the direction from November 4, 2025 (15), County Counsel submitted a draft ordinance for Board consideration on March 3, 2026. The draft ordinance, identified as Chapter 28 of the County Code, is designed to promote fairness, equity, and transparency in the landlord-tenant relationship. Beyond the burden of base rent, the Board identified that "junk fees", such as pet rent, valet trash, and excessive screening charges, act as significant barriers to housing stability, particularly for low-income renters and communities of color. By requiring total cost transparency and limiting non-rent fees to a strict percentage of monthly rent, this ordinance, if approved, will ensure that "all-in" housing costs are clear and manageable.

Staff Analysis on Enforcement and Operations

On November 4, 2025 (15), the Board directed the CAO to report back within 120 days to estimate the cost, staffing, and contract needs to enforce violations of the proposed ordinance. In response, County staff conducted an analysis which yielded the following enforcement and educational options.

Option for an Enforcement Program

To support effective implementation and enforcement of the ordinance, a scalable enforcement framework could be established, modeled after prior labor standards compliance and contract oversight efforts. This approach builds on prior Board direction establishing the Office of Labor Standards and Enforcement, which emphasized education, coordination, and enforcement, and identified the need for dedicated staffing and tools to support compliance and accountability across County programs.

The proposed framework would provide both strategic oversight and operational enforcement capacity, ensuring consistency, accountability, and alignment with County enforcement practices. This model is designed to be adaptable and applied across multiple program areas requiring enhanced compliance and monitoring and could be housed within an existing County department or office.

Under this approach, the County would implement a structure to support program design, policy implementation, interdepartmental coordination, including with County Counsel, and day-to-day enforcement activities. This work would require the addition of approximately two full-time equivalents, at an estimated cost of \$350,000 for salaries and benefits, to be classified by the Department of Human Resources. Classifications will be based on scope of responsibilities required to implement an internal enforcement program for an ordinance adopted by the Board.

This model would strengthen front-end compliance, monitoring, and enforcement functions while maintaining flexibility in program implementation. Based on comparable programs, a structure of this size would typically support approximately 20–40 active cases at a time, depending on complexity, with additional capacity for intake, triage, and resolution of less complex matters. Violations of the ordinance would be subject to civil enforcement, and any matters involving potential criminal conduct would be referred to the appropriate law enforcement authorities.

Option for Contracted Services to Provide Outreach and Education

As a proactive approach to enforcement, the County could utilize contractual partnerships to provide educational materials and conduct outreach activities to inform renters and landlords of the protections within the ordinance approved by the Board. This could be accomplished through amending the current

contract for tenant legal services or procurement of a new contract through the Request for Proposals (RFP) process. Costs would be dependent on the level of outreach and education to provide to residents seeking assistance. If this option is selected by the Board, staff will return with cost options of a new contract or amending the existing contract.

Option for Contracted Services to Support Individual Actions

The ordinance outlines remedies that individuals can pursue through the court or legal process. The County could contract with a legal services provider to represent individuals in bringing forward legal actions. This could be accomplished through amending the current contract for tenant legal services or procurement of a new contract through the RFP process. Costs would be dependent on the anticipated volume of individuals requiring assistance through the court or legal process. If this option is selected by the Board, staff will return with a costs analysis associated with a new contract or amending the existing contract.

Following the Board's approval of an ordinance and selection of the desired education and/or enforcement option(s), staff will return with program design and fiscal impact for the Board's consideration. TITLE 15 INSPECTION REPORT SUMMARY FOR LOCAL DETENTION FACILITIES IN SAN DIEGO COUNTY: FISCAL YEAR 2024 – 2025

The purpose of this memorandum, pursuant to California Health & Safety Code 101045 Section (a), is to provide the San Diego County Board of Supervisors with the findings from the annual inspections conducted in accordance with Title 15 of the California Code of Regulations. Title 15 establishes minimum standards for the operation of local adult and juvenile detention facilities, courts, police and sheriff departments within San Diego County.

These inspections assess compliance in areas of medical/mental health, nutrition, and environmental health, consistent with standards set by the California Board of State Community Corrections (BSCC). Under the direction of the County of San Diego (County) Public Health Officer, the County works with its contracted partner, the National Commission of Correction Health Care Resource, Inc., to conduct medical/mental health and nutritional inspections. In Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25, the County Department of Environmental Health and Quality conducted the environment inspections, including evaluations of facility sanitation, bedding and linen, and food safety.

Detention facilities are required to address any identified deficiencies through corrective action plans. Continued noncompliance/deficiencies may result in increased oversight by BSCC. During FY 2024-25, a total of 40 public detention facilities were in operation in San Diego County.

Inspection Reports and Key Findings

Inspection reports are publicly available on the BSCC website at https://www.bscc.ca.gov/s_fsolocaldetentionfacilityinspectionreports/. Specifically, the calendar year 2024-25 reports can be accessed at:

Overall, inspected facilities were in compliance or came into compliance with Title 15 minimum standards. While major findings were identified within seven facilities, all seven came into compliance by fulfilling plan of corrections. A summary of the key findings and responses are noted in Attachment A and provided at a high level below:

- **Medical/Mental Health Inspections:** Two facilities had corrective action plans, which were resolved through the submission and review of pharmacy reports and healthcare audit reports to demonstrate compliance.
- **Nutritional Inspections:** Six facilities required corrective action plans, which were resolved as follows: the Registered Dietitian reviewed and signed the nutritional diet manual, and copies were placed in both the medical unit and food service office. Menus were updated to include the appropriate amount of calcium to meet nutritional requirements. A three-day sample tray process was developed. Additionally, procedures were established to order specialized diets, including medical, vegan, religious, and vegetarian options.
- **Food Safety Inspections:** One facility required a plan of correction due to a high-temperature dish machine that was unable to reach the required temperature for proper disinfection; a reinspection conducted two weeks later confirmed the machine had been repaired and the violation was abated. The same facility also required a plan of correction due to vermin activity observed in the food facility, resulting in a temporary closure of the affected area; a reinspection conducted two days later found no evidence of vermin activity, confirmed that cleaning and disinfection had been completed, and verified that pest control treatment records were in place, allowing the area to reopen. Additionally, a new procedure was implemented to ensure that all food contact surfaces, including handwashing and ware-washing sinks, are properly cleaned and sanitized.

ONE-YEAR UPDATE ON PROPOSITION 36 IMPLEMENTATION

Proposition 36 (Prop 36), *The Homelessness, Drug Addiction, and Theft Reduction Act*, became effective December 18, 2024. The measure reclassified certain misdemeanor theft and drug offenses as felonies when they were repeat offenses and created a treatment-mandated felony (TMF) pathway allowing eligible individuals charged under California Health and Safety Code (HS) section 11395 to participate in treatment in lieu of a felony conviction through Deferred Entry of Judgment (DEOJ).

In September 2025, staff provided the Board with a nine-month update outlining early impacts across detention, prosecution, defense, behavioral health, and supervision functions. This memorandum provides a one-year systemwide update through December 31, 2025.

After twelve months of implementation, Prop 36 has significantly impacted workload patterns across the County's justice and health systems. While core operational processes have stabilized, workload pressures have not diminished. Impacts continue to accumulate across detention capacity, felony court filings, defense caseloads, behavioral health evaluation volume, and probation supervision.

At this stage, it remains too early to assess long-term outcomes tied to the intent of Prop 36. TMF/DEOJ participation can extend six to twelve months or longer and that pathway was not formally established until April 2025, leaving only a partial first-year treatment population. Individuals sentenced to formal probation instead of TMF/DEOJ are typically supervised for two years. As a result, outcome measures such as treatment completion rates, recidivism reductions, and sustained community impact will require additional years of observation.

SYSTEMWIDE OVERVIEW OF ONE-YEAR IMPACTS

One year after Prop 36 took effect, its operational impact is evident across detention, courts, defense, behavioral health, and probation systems, as well as in early community-level indicators, such as changes

in property crime trends, increased engagement in treatment pathways, and shifts in supervision patterns. While implementation occurred rapidly and core operational pathways are now in place, the measure introduced structural changes that continue to drive workload, causing fiscal and capacity pressures beyond what existing resources can absorb. The San Diego region's experience mirrors statewide trends, with counties reporting similar increases in felony filings, jail bookings, and treatment demands.

Year one reflects several implementation dynamics:

- Significant growth in jail population with higher-acuity needs
- Increase in felony filings and case complexity
- Launch of a court and cross-department treatment-mandated felony pathway
- Expanded court procedures and collaborative calendar requirements
- Substantial growth in probation caseloads and supervision length

Beyond system operations, a December 2025 [press release](#)¹ by the District Attorney's Office, indicated that Prop 36 enforcement coincides with reported improvements in downtown San Diego property crime and increased business confidence related to accountability for repeat offenders. While these trends align with enhanced enforcement and repeat-theft provisions under the measure, additional factors may also contribute, such as policing strategies, inventory protection measures, and local enforcement priorities. Continued monitoring will be necessary to determine the measure's specific impact and whether reductions are sustained over time.

At the same time, fiscal pressures are significant; first-year costs attributable to Prop 36 exceeded \$57.8M for detention alone, with additional multimillion-dollar impacts across prosecution, defense, behavioral health, and supervision. No dedicated ongoing state funding exists for these operational or programming needs, making sustainability a critical concern moving forward.

Detention and Custody - Population Growth and Higher Needs

Since Prop 36 took effect, the Sheriff's Office has seen a significant rise in jail population and service demands. More than 4,000 individuals have been booked under its provisions, about 7.4 percent of all bookings, driving a 13 percent increase in average daily population from 3,900 in January 2025 to a peak of 4,400 in September. By the final quarter of 2025, the population declined slightly, averaging approximately 4,200 per day. Such shifts underscore the significant operational impact of legislative changes on local detention facilities.

Many individuals arrive with extensive substance-use histories and significant medical needs, requiring higher levels of medical and mental health care. More than 75 percent were booked under HS 11395 (drug-related offense); 53 percent required medication-assisted treatment or withdrawal monitoring; 21 percent had ADA-qualifying disabilities; and hospital transfers occurred at more than twice the general jail rate (7 percent vs. 3 percent), all of which drives up costs for health services, food, transportation, and other essential needs for incarcerated persons. The average daily cost to house a person in San Diego County's jails is based on fixed expenses such as staffing, incarcerated person uniforms, food, transportation, and

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basic medical care. Using the Sheriff's FY 2025–26 Courtesy Housing Rate of \$428 per bed day,² the cost to house the Prop 36 population to date is approximately \$62.4 million. Although this figure reflects a standardized housing rate rather than the true operational cost of incarceration, it provides a useful measure of the scale of resources required to manage this population. It's also important to note that costs increase further when individuals require additional medical, mental health, or substance-use treatment, and when more people booked under Prop 36 face additional unrelated charges.

The Sheriff's Office absorbed initial impacts of Prop 36 within its existing budget by making staffing and operational adjustments. These adjustments included phased openings of two additional housing units at the Rock Mountain Detention Facility (RMDF) and adding a Captain to oversee expanded responsibilities. However, the Sheriff's Office projects the need for 36 additional FTEs over three years, including 23 in FY 2026-27 at an estimated cost of \$5.4 million, followed by five in Year 2 and eight in Year 3. Without these positions, overtime and staff burnout will persist and it will be more difficult to treat a population with significant needs.

The Sheriff's Office relied on internal strategies, including allowing supervisory staff to cover deputy-level overtime shifts in detention facilities to maintain operational flexibility during periods of heightened medical transport and booking activity, as well as plans to convert 68 detentions deputy positions to law enforcement positions, which increases flexibility in hiring and training to staff vacancies. These measures served as short-term bridges while new academy graduates entered the workforce, helping to increase staffing levels. However, sustained Prop 36–related population levels and consistently elevated medical and behavioral health demands have still exceeded what can be absorbed through temporary strategies. As a result, continued reliance on these strategies is no longer feasible, and dedicated staffing and funding are now required to maintain safe and stable operations.

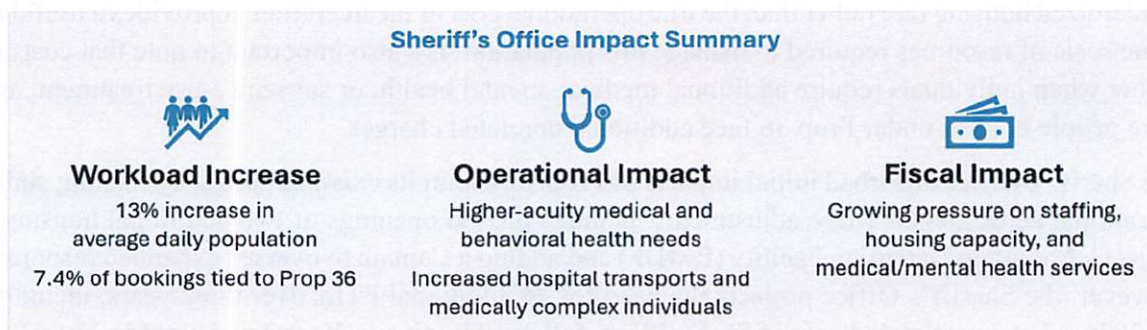
As we forecast future years under Prop 36, the Sheriff's Office anticipates that as the population makes its way through the judicial process, some offenders may not qualify for, or may not succeed in, community-based programs. Those individuals may then be sentenced to County Jail for extended lengths of stay. These longer stays create opportunities for substance use treatment, education, and reentry programming, but they will require dedicated funding. As these longer stays create opportunities, demand for in-custody services will grow. However, no dedicated state funding exists to support these expanded efforts.

Last year's state enacted budget allocation of \$110 million did not include Sheriffs for funding. However, sustained funding for detention services, including medical care, mental health treatment, and rehabilitative programming, is essential to ensure Prop 36 can deliver the services and outcomes intended

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by voters. The Sheriff continues to advocate at the state level for medical, mental health, and rehabilitative resources associated with the implementation of the proposition.



Court Operations and Prosecution - Managing Increased Felony Workload

As of December 31, 2025, the District Attorney's Office filed over 3,300 cases under Prop 36, including more than 2,200 repeat drug offenses under HS 11395 and nearly 1,100 repeat theft offenses under Penal Code (PC) section 666.1. Monthly felony case averages were approximately 183 for HS 11395 cases and 89 for PC 666.1 cases, with volumes remaining steady throughout the year.

While overall combined filings increased 3.5% from 2024 to 2025, the composition of cases shifted significantly. Felony filings rose sharply, up nearly 24% year-over-year (11,599 in 2024 to 14,353 in 2025), while misdemeanor filings declined by nearly 10% (17,857 to 16,125). This shift toward felony cases has increased complexity and resource demands, even as total filings remain relatively stable.

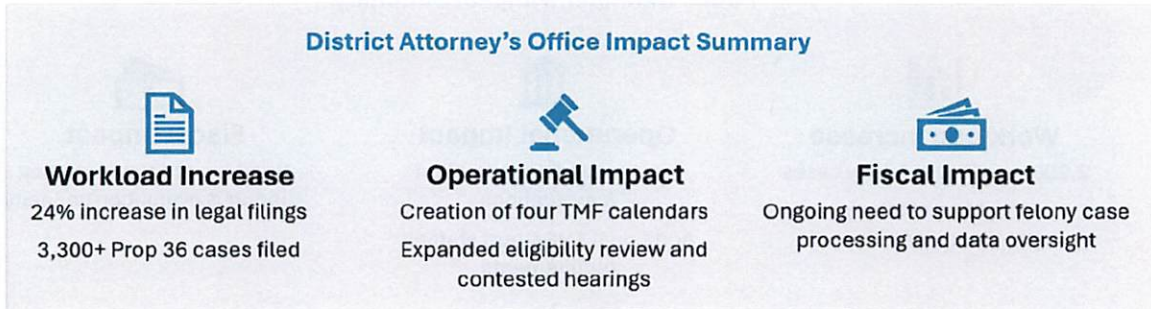
To manage Prop 36 cases, the District Attorney's Office supported the Superior Court and justice partners establishing four dedicated TMF Court calendars across regional courthouses and anticipates ongoing Prop 36-attributable staffing costs of approximately \$1.5 million annually to maintain coverage and monitor implementation data.

The TMF/DEOJ treatment pathway, formally adopted by the court in April 2025, generated more than 600 referrals through year-end. Of these, 495 were accepted, 96 remain pending, and two cases have completed treatment, a modest but important milestone given program timelines. An additional 16 referrals declined or terminated treatment. Referral volumes averaged about 70 per month throughout the year. One clear outcome from Proposition 36 is that 72% of the HS 11395 (TMF) defendants are on a DEOJ treatment track and another 25% are eligible for treatment through a probation track, for about 97% of this population in a treatment track with a potential for lowered recidivism, reduced overdoses and better health outcomes. Only 3.2% of this group received a jail or prison sentence, which meets the DA's goal of mass treatment rather than mass incarceration.

The District Attorney's Office and business partners also reported community-level outcomes associated with repeat theft enforcement under Prop 36. Of cases charged under the measure's two primary provisions, approximately 35 percent involved repeat theft offenses. San Diego Police Department data indicate a 23 percent reduction in downtown property crimes in 2025 compared to 2024, and businesses expressed relief related to improved accountability for repeat offenders. These observations coincide with Prop 36 implementation, but crime trends can be influenced by many factors. Ongoing review will be necessary to understand the extent to which Prop 36 contributes to these changes over time.

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Looking ahead, ongoing operational needs center on felony case complexity and cumulative workload growth. While early successes include the completion of some TMF/DEOJ cases and steady referral volumes, ongoing staffing and process improvements will be critical to maintaining program integrity and timely treatment placement.



Public Defense - Caseload Growth and Representation Complexity

Prop 36 has materially altered the volume and complexity of defense representation. Felony drug cases assigned to the Public Defender's Office more than doubled in 2025, averaging 196 per month compared to 88 per month in 2024; misdemeanor drug cases increased from 236 to 300 per month due to an influx of cases from the City Attorney's Office. The department was appointed to over 2,200 additional felony cases associated with Prop 36. This surge affects every stage of representation—from arraignments and bail hearings to case evaluations, motions, mental health assessments, TMF/DEOJ Court staffing, jury trial preparation, and sentencing. Clients are also increasingly contesting misdemeanor cases to avoid convictions that could later support felony charges, adding further complexity.

The Public Defender's Holistic Services Unit has also experienced increased demand, as more clients require support with treatment access, housing, and related services. Participation in TMF/DEOJ programs continues to grow, adding to the scope of representation responsibilities. While graduation milestones have not yet been reached, initial progress indicates program successes are anticipated later this fiscal year.

Prior workload modeling indicated that every 1,000 additional felony filings require 14 attorneys and four support staff, at an estimated \$6.1 million. Based on current Prop 36-related volumes, this equates to an associated cost of more than \$12.2 million and reflects the scale of staffing impact resulting from the measure.

To manage this growth, the Public Defender has already reallocated personnel from other units and deployed internal strategies to absorb workload increases. Capacity constraints have also required the El Cajon branch to decline some new case appointments, leading to cases being redirected to the Office of Assigned Counsel (OAC) at higher cost to the County. Despite these measures, the department has determined a FY 2026-27 additional budget need of nearly \$2.7 million in salary and benefit costs to sustain the staffing levels required for constitutionally adequate representation. In addition, approximately 1,000 Prop 36 cases per year require psychological evaluations, resulting in an estimated \$3 million in additional annual costs at roughly \$3,000 per evaluation. These evaluations are separate from those conducted by BHS as part of the TMF/DEOJ process.

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The department is now operating beyond sustainable capacity, and further caseload increases without additional staffing would heighten risks related to meeting constitutional representation standards. If volumes continue to rise, case redirection to OAC may be required in additional regional offices.



Behavioral Health Services and Treatment Capacity

Following the formal adoption of the TMF/DEOJ treatment pathway on April 7, 2025, Behavioral Health Services (BHS) began accepting referrals and quickly stabilized operations. After the initial implementation month, referral volumes averaged between 60 and 79 per month, with a slight dip in December due to court closures during the holiday period.

From April through December 31, 2025, BHS received 552 referrals and completed 526 evaluations. Evaluation outcomes included 73% recommended for outpatient care, 10% for residential treatment, 6% for Narcotic Treatment Programs, and 3% for intensive outpatient services; 7% of individuals were not reachable, and 1% did not meet treatment criteria. Approximately 52% of evaluations occurred while individuals were in custody, and 48% occurred post-release, meaning not all referred individuals were immediately available to begin treatment.

Treatment durations typically range from six to twelve months or longer. As of December 2025, two participants had completed treatment, a reflection of program timelines rather than performance. Referrals originated from all regional courts, with 36% from north, 34% from east, 29% from central, and less than 1% from south.

To rapidly stand up services and comply with Proposition 36 requirements, BHS reassigned three County licensed clinicians and partial FTE support, including a Program Manager, two Legal Support Assistants, and one Office Assistant. On May 20, 2025 (17), the Board authorized procurement of regionally based drug court contracts to incorporate TMF/DEOJ evaluation and care coordination.

Fiscal sustainability remains a priority as BHS anticipates substantial growth in service volume. While many services are Medi-Cal eligible, there are still County costs associated with these services. To help mitigate these pressures, BHS has responded to a Request for Information from the California Department of Health Care Services seeking approximately \$3 million in one-time funding to support capacity building, program coordination and data infrastructure. However, because this funding is one-time, it does not address long-term operational needs.

Looking ahead, BHS plans to further integrate TMF/DEOJ assessment and referral functions with the County's Drug Medi-Cal Organized Delivery System treatment network to ensure consistency, scalability, and long-term sustainability. BHS is also working closely with the Public Safety Group Executive Office to strengthen integration of services for the Prop 36 population across contracts and departments. To

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facilitate coordinated care, contractors obtain appropriate information-sharing authorizations at the outset of services, enabling timely cross-system communication and minimizing service disruption when clients move between providers.



Probation Supervision and Growing Caseloads

Although the Probation Department is not formally part of the Prop 36 treatment-mandated felony program, the department continues to experience significant indirect impacts. Its role is operationally separate and distinct from the TMF/DEOJ track. While the TMF/DEOJ program focuses narrowly on treatment compliance for qualifying drug offenses, Probation supervises individuals who decline participation, are found ineligible, or opt out due to plea decisions or other factors. These clients are typically sentenced to formal probation, which includes comprehensive oversight beyond treatment, such as risk and needs assessments, potential housing and employment support, and compliance monitoring. This shift is a result of Prop 36 reclassifying several theft and drug misdemeanors as felonies for repeat offenders. Consequently, individuals who do not enter or complete the TMF/DEOJ program are often sentenced to traditional felony probation, which requires more intensive supervision than the low-level misdemeanors they replaced.

The number of individuals entering formal probation supervision has been much greater than anticipated. Courts are increasingly placing clients on probation when they do not participate in TMF/DEOJ, and multi-year supervision terms create a cumulative, compounding workload effect. Because the average period of supervision is two years, and the Prop 36 population presents higher treatment and monitoring needs, caseload growth will continue until the department begins to see its first potential exits, currently projected to be at least one to two years away. Even then, Probation expects this population to remain at an elevated, sustained level for an extended period due to Probation's role as an alternative path where an individual does not choose to participate in, or is not eligible for, the TMF/DEOJ program. Additional impacts are also anticipated from individuals exiting prison on Prop 36 sentences and entering post-release community supervision, further expanding Probation caseloads.

As of December 31, 2025, Probation had processed nearly 1,200 individuals with Prop 36-related offenses. Of these, the Pretrial Unit monitored approximately 650 clients, a caseload increase of about 15 percent, and more than 620 individuals were under active probation supervision, with that number continuing to grow each month. The Pretrial Unit plays a critical role in monitoring individuals released on Supervised Own Recognizance (SOR) pending adjudication. These clients require compliance monitoring, linkage to services, and reminders to return to court. The increase in Prop 36-related SOR releases has significantly expanded Pretrial workload.

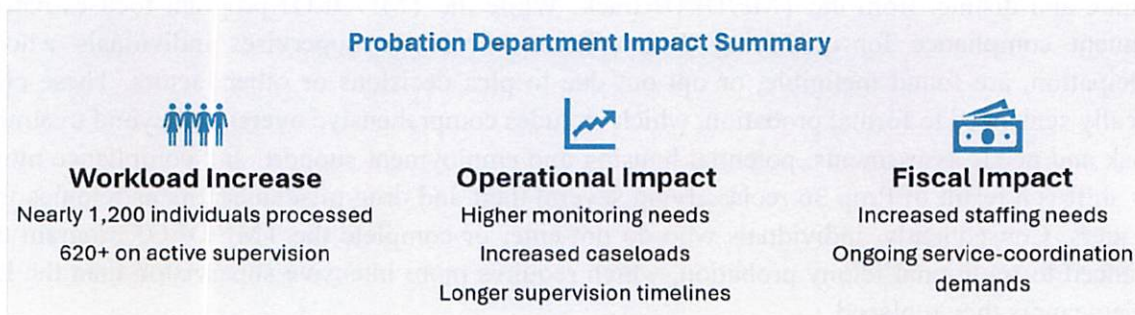
As part of Probation supervision, the department has several treatment and support system options available to clients. These include residential treatment programs, temporary housing combined with

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outpatient care, and specialized supports through the Reentry Services team, Alcohol and Drug Program Specialists, housing resource navigators, and the Community Transition Center.

The workloads of 15 Deputy Probation Officers and Probation Aides have increased due to Prop 36. The department estimates approximately \$2.6 million in ongoing salary and benefit costs to support the additional workload and ensure sustainability of services to Probation clients moving forward.

Looking ahead, Probation anticipates continued growth in Prop 36 caseloads due to the two-year average supervision term and the higher-need treatment characteristics of this population, resulting in caseloads that will compound for at least the next one to two years before any decline is possible. Further impacts are possible if the TMF/DEOJ program expands into other collaborative courts, which typically involve the Probation Department. Increased client oversight may also lead to more custodial sanctions for violations and subsequent referrals requiring Probation intervention. Beyond current impacts, future cost drivers may include expanded staffing needs, contracted treatment services, data collection, and program evaluation. The department will continue monitoring caseload trends and service demand to inform staffing plans and fiscal projections for upcoming budget cycles.



FISCAL OUTLOOK SUMMARY

When Prop 36 took effect, departments were still in the early stages of establishing new court processes, ramping up TMF operations, and determining how the measure would shift workloads across justice and behavioral health systems.

With formal TMF Court operations beginning in April 2025 and workload patterns continuing to evolve throughout the year, departments did not advance budget requests during the development of the Fiscal Year 2025–26 CAO Recommended Budget. During this time, departments collected emerging data on jail stays, case processing timelines, medical and behavioral health needs, and supervision demands. This approach allowed for a more accurate assessment of the scale, trajectory, and ongoing impacts of Prop 36 before recommending associated funding strategies.

Costs associated with first-year implementation are significant across departments. For FY 2026-27, resource needs include additional staffing, medical and behavioral health treatment capacity, psychological evaluations, and expanded supervision and monitoring functions. These investments are necessary to maintain safe operations, meet constitutional and statutory obligations, and support the new court processes established under Prop 36.

Statewide Impacts: San Diego County’s experience mirrors statewide patterns. Counties across California report increased felony filings, expanded use of treatment-mandated pathways, higher jail bookings for repeat offenders, and increased demands on public defense and probation supervision. While the State

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Legislature has appropriated a limited amount of one-time funding to assist implementation related to behavioral health services, allocations will be distributed across all counties and not dedicated solely to Prop 36. At this time, there is no ongoing funding directed to detention, prosecution, public defense, behavioral health, or probation impacts. As treatment and supervision timelines extend into future fiscal years, counties continue to assess long-term sustainability without a dedicated State funding stream.

Legislative Advocacy: On November 4, 2025 (13), the Board of Supervisors directed the Chief Administrative Officer to amend the County's Legislative Program to include advocacy for dedicated and sustainable State funding for Prop 36 implementation. This direction prioritizes resources for law enforcement, justice, and behavioral health functions. The Board emphasized that funding is critical to achieving Prop 36's goals of reducing crime, addressing addiction and homelessness, and ensuring equitable access to treatment pathways. The FY 2026–27 requests summarized above represent the resources necessary to maintain core system functions under current Prop 36 workload levels.

ONGOING MONITORING AND REPORTING

As implementation moves into its second year, partner departments will continue monitoring Prop 36 activity and sharing information on both collective and department-specific impacts. The formal TMF Court process was not established until April 2025, meaning most TMF participants are still early in their treatment timelines. Treatment programs under the TMF/DEOJ model typically span six to twelve months or longer, so many participants will not reach completion milestones until future reporting periods. Separately, individuals who do not participate in TMF and are instead sentenced to formal probation often remain under supervision for up to two years, creating a different monitoring window and data trajectory.

The ultimate intent of these structured pathways is to reduce the long-term strain on the justice and health systems by successfully breaking the cycle of recidivism for repeat theft and drug offenders. While Year One has required significant front-end resource investments, the goal is to determine if these interventions lead to a more sustainable system with fewer "revolving door" cases in the County's jails and courts in the years to come.

As additional information becomes available, departments will continue tracking indicators such as caseloads, treatment referrals, participation, case progression, and early trends in potential community impacts. Several reporting tools already provide some insight into Prop 36 impacts: the Sheriff's Office maintains a daily [Prop 36 dashboard](#);³ the District Attorney provides updates through its [Prop 36 webpage](#);⁴ the Public Defender is enhancing its case management system to include Prop 36 tracking, BHS is working to integrate Prop 36 tracking into the Electronic Health Record for standardized and streamlined reporting; and Probation has developed an internal dashboard that monitors information on its Prop 36 supervision caseloads. In addition, Probation already tracks data on referrals, completions, and recidivism consistent with the department's standard supervision metrics.

The Judicial Council, in collaboration with the Department of Health Care Services, has also begun developing a statewide reporting framework for Prop 36 based on data submitted by trial courts. This effort is separate from the County's internal dashboards and operational tracking but provides insight into the kinds of information the state legislature is requesting to understand Prop 36 impacts. Given the

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significant scope of data the trial courts are required to provide, departments are reviewing these elements to understand where existing local systems may already align with those requirements.

Moving forward, impacted departments will continue to convene to explore which additional data points are most accessible within existing systems. This collaborative effort will explore markers of success to inform decision-makers on whether the current framework is meeting local needs, achieving the intended reduction in system strain, or whether additional state support is required to sustain the mandate.

CONCLUSION

One year after implementation, Prop 36 is operating as a full system intervention affecting every stage of the County's justice and treatment continuum. It has simultaneously reshaped booking patterns, charging practices, jail population trends, treatment referrals and evaluations, defense caseloads, and probation supervision volumes. Certain enforcement benefits, particularly around repeat retail theft deterrence, have been reported. Community-level impacts, including reported reductions in property crime and improved business confidence, will require continued monitoring to assess long-term trends and confirm sustained outcomes. At the same time, capacity pressures remain elevated, and long-term treatment and recidivism outcomes cannot yet be assessed given the extended nature of program timelines. Departments will continue monitoring trends and determine fiscal support needs in the upcoming budget cycle to support operations under current workload conditions.
